## Mostly Closed

- Law enforcement misconduct records are not public records
  - ▶ Washington, D.C.; Delaware; Idaho; Mississippi; Virginia
- Only a very limited amount of information may be disclosed in certain instances
  - If there is a compelling public interest and records deal with an officer's official suspension or termination (Arkansas)
  - If an officer is demoted, dismissed, or suspended and the date of the disciplinary action (North Carolina; Pennsylvania)
  - Database with names of decertified officers (Oregon)

#### Restricted

- Police disciplinary records are open, but agencies can require requesters to state the reason for the request (Alabama)
- Access to records regarding instances of excessive force, any incident where an officer fires a gun at someone, and records relating to sexual misconduct (California)
- Records related to specific, identifiable incidents of alleged misconduct involving a member of the public (Colorado)
- Records of completed/closed investigations, except for those that don't result in discipline or are unsubstantiated (Maine)

## Mostly Public

- Records of completed or closed investigations generally open (Arizona; Georgia; Tennessee)
- Misconduct registry detailing general information re: what an officer was cited for (Illinois)
- Records of police misconduct open to the public (Louisiana; Maryland; Massachusetts; Minnesota; New York; North Dakota; Ohio; Washington; Wisconsin)

### Where does Virginia fall?

- Currently, police disciplinary records are not widely open and available to the public.
  - ▶ § 2.2-3705.1  $\rightarrow$  Personnel Exemption (discretionary exemption)
